Revolutionary Continuity Encounters the Change of the Opposing Half by Daniel Finco

Ever since the primary elections for the candidate of the "Unidad", or opposing group of political parties, there is little doubt that there has never been an event of such transcendentalism in Venezuela than the 7-O presidential elections.

Current Venezuelan president Hugo Chavez's opposing candidate, Henrique Capriles Randonski, points out that the country has advanced nowhere in the past decade, regardless of the promises and hopes that Chavez has given through his populist approach, and that we urgently need a change. What calls the attention of the whole Venezuelan and international community is not only that the approaches are drastically opposite, but also the possibility that both of them could be consecrated the winner.

Interestingly enough, the 7-O Elections are the only ones in the democratic history of our country in which the two options presented reflect the two conflicting Venezuelas, a nation of increasingly polarized opinions.

Regardless of who the winner is, he must not alienate the other half of Venezuelans. Inclusion is the key element to reach sustainable development. In other words, Venezuela's government path must

change or the nation will crumble into social and economic ruin.



Hugo Chavez has governed the country for the last 14 years and aspires to do so for a third term. Since the beginning of his career, he has proposed a political path different from the one of the previous decades. Through the use of his charismatic abilities and the massive construction of social aid programs aimed at improving the life of Venezuela's poor, Chavez intends to reduce the poverty rate substantially by distributing the wealth of the country more equitably. However, although Chavez's future plans for Venezuela seem very promising, he also intends to eradicate the private industry and the wealthy social class of the country under the idea that "imperialism" and "oligarchy" are harmful to the social stability of the country. This is the crucial mistake in his political beliefs.

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If Chavez's definition of "change" involves the widening of the abyss between the rich and the poor, the possession of the natural resources of the country reserved solely for the benefit of the "have nots," and the usage of corruption and unethical actions to omit the laws of the constitution without being seen as disloyal to one's country, then Mr. Chavez has executed a wonderfully successful job in his presidential term.

From the eyes of the international community, taking into account the modern globalized styles of government, Chavez's change aims backwards from the general trend of neighboring countries. This decaying trend is easily noticeable in the division of Venezuela that ultimately led to the increase of already-existing social and economic issues. This division is reflected in recent surveys done by Venezuelan statistical organizations: "Varianzas" and "Consultores 21" place Capriles as the winner, while on the other hand, "Dataanalysis" and "Hinterenlaces" place Chavez as the winner. Among the most objective of them all, the margin of difference is quite small, and the percentage of the electorates that will vote but will not reveal for whom represent the key voters that will determine the winner in the end.

We have seen wide contrasts in the electoral campaigns in both form and content, which account to what we witness today. Capriles Radonski, who launched a "grassroots" campaign by visiting home after home, reached his competitor two weeks before election day.

On the other hand, Chavez has shown himself inaugurating projects and social aid programs via long TV transmissions, making his campaign somewhat distanced and obscure.



Also, Venezuela's underestimated social division is promoted by Chavez and smoothened by Capriles. Words of the current president explicitly express: "Con Chavez todo, sin Chavez nada," meaning that with Chavez there is everything and without him there is nothing. On the other hand, Capriles demonstrates to the Venezuelans that his form of government will promote efficiency, honesty and opportunities for everybody, proclaiming that "no importa el color, en mi gobierno caben todos los colores," which suggests that in his government, everything fits.

Although Capriles' approach seems to be the one which will break the pondering division of the country, over half of the Venezuelans support Chavez. However, regardless of who takes control of the country in the end, the abyss between the "haves" and the "have nots" must be taken into account by any president because this is the key factor that will lead Venezuela to a more social, economic and sustainable future.

The Triple-Crown of the New Monarch

The imperturbable temper of Miguel Cabrera could be felt since he landed in the MLB, in that memorable inning against Roger Clemens in the fifth game of the 2003 World Series.

Clemens tried to intimidate Cabrera with a nearly straight fast ball up to the chin of the then 20-year Venezuelan prodigy. Batting from the right side of the plate, Cabrera was unfazed, and hit a homer to the right field of the old Marlins stadium.

People still remember Cabrera's behavior after that point: relaxed, unaware of the turmoil his team and the rest of the world was going through because of him.

Almost a decade later, at Kauffman Stadium in Kansas City, Cabrera reached a milestone as few have in major league baseball: he became the 15th batter to complete the Triple Crown, as a leader in average (.330), home runs (44) and RBIs (139).

His name now appears alongside legends like Mickey Mantle, Ted Williams and Lou Gehrig.

But most striking are the names that are not on the list, like Babe Ruth, Roberto Clemente or Stan Musial. None of them could get the trimmed mythical feat.

Nobody had reached three offensive statistics leaded since Carl Yastrzemski of the Boston Red Sox in 1967.

After the game, Cabrera spoke to reporters with the gentle tone that characterizes him, constantly remembering that the most important thing was that his Detroit Tigers had completed the regular season with the pass in hand to play the playoffs.

His hands were in a sweatshirt. But, this time, could not contain his excitement at the circumstances of the moment to drop a "wow".

"Everybody tells me it's incredible," he said. "All are happy to have witnessed this, to have enjoyed me being a part. And I feel better because we won."

It was what many Venezuelans were waiting for in 2003 in his debut with a home run. Everyone knew that he would be the next MLB super star. The Triple Crown was seen as impossible, a relic of the past. But we knew that Miggy could do it.

He being the first batter to earn the Triple Crown title in more than 40 years is quite amazing, but being the first Latino to win the degree in batting and pitching stats is even more outstanding. Miguel Cabrera will be the monarch for a long while, and for many, it will be the only monarchy they will be proud of and that will not be criticized.

I asked her how often she brushed her teeth and she giggled saying she couldn't even remember the last time she did. Her dad was the one who brought supplies from town and right now he didn't have enough money to buy another toothpaste for the family; there were other supplies they needed more.

I didn't know what to say. At home I have a stack of toothpaste for whenever it runs out I go and grab the next one. I put toothpaste on my toothbrush at least twice while I am brushing my

teeth. I don't think about how much I need to use or how often I should do it. I am sure you don't either. At that moment I just wished I could get some of those toothpastes I had home and bring them back there for all these kids. Their smiles are deteriorating slowly as their teeth begin to rot. I felt the need to teach them the importance of hygiene but I would have only upset them if they didn't have the supplies to do it.

These kids opened their hearts to us from the moment we arrived. I made a very special friend at one of the schools. Her name was Dania. She told me not to forget that her birthday was this November 2nd and that I should think of her wherever I was that day. Trust me, I will. I liked how happy she was to have me there. It seemed like I had known her for so long. She took me everywhere; she wanted to show me that she knew the place like no one else did. The best thing she taught me was that she so little and innocent, and knew the most important thing in life: to always carry a smile. This girl was happier than anyone else who has all the riches in the world. She, in her humble environment, living in destitute conditions, could only see the world through joy.

This, more than interviews and filming, helped me understand that the reason the indigenous people continue to live happily in their poor living condition is their humbleness.
