Venezuelan Soccer Taking a Stance Against the World

The Venezuelan National soccer team, also known as "La Vinotinto" due to its burgundy colored uniform, is climbing up the Coca-Cola Fifa World Ranking. Venezuela is currently in the 43rd spot with 622 points out of the 207 available. Soccer is a rising sport in Venezuela filling the hearts of many with passion and the desire to be in the next Fifa World Cup, which will take place in Brazil in the summer of 2014.

Venezuelans are full of hope after knowing that the group is located in a qualifying position for the moment and the games left are against those under them in the classificatory leader boards. The only truth is that all teams in Venezuela's pass to the World cup are countries of higher position in the world ranking, Peru being the closest in the 42nd spot with 624 points, Paraguay in the 38th with 640 points, Bolivia in the 37th with 641 points, Chile in the 22nd with 829 points, Brazil in the 18th with 908 points, Uruguay in the 16th with 950 points, Ecuador in the 11th with 1037 points, Colombia in the 6th with 1159 points, and as the top ranked South American country Argentina is in the 3rd spot with 1309. These points represent the quality of the Argentinian team over the last 4 years.

In the qualifiers itself, Venezuela is tied in the 4th with Chile. The first place goes to Argentina with 24 points, the second to Ecuador with 20 points, the 3rd to Colombia with 19 points, 4th to Chile and Venezuela with 15 points, 6th to Uruguay with 13 points, 7th to Peru with 11 points, 8th to Bolivia with 9 points and last in the 9th spot, Paraguay with only 8 points.

Venezuela is currently tied with Chile in points and goal difference, but the next thing that needs to be judged are goals in favor for which Chile has 16 and Venezuela only has 9. This makes the Venezuelan squad sit on the 5th spot, but if seeing the games won, tied and lost, they are tied in 4th.

If the qualifiers ended today just as they are, Venezuela would play against the 5th of the Asian Qualifier for a spot in the World Cup. Being in the top 4 makes you go straight to the honorary soccer tournaments, where only the best get the opportunity to play.

The Coca-Cola Fifa Ranking spots are set from March 14th. From that date until now Venezuela lost versus Argentina but beat Colombia by the minimum with a magnificent goal by the Venezuelan forward Jose Salomon Rondon. After the calculation is done, this would leave Venezuela with 708 points putting them in the mid 30's just over Serbia which is in the 35th spot of the world ranking with 659 points. This new positioning will be released at the end of April.

As a Venezuelan, soccer is a passion to me as it is to many. These soccer players are more than a team for our country. From my perspective, the sport is the only thing that keeps Venezuela united. It's the only thing in which all Venezuelans agree on no matter if they are rich or poor, black or white, religious or agnostic, socialist or capitalist. It's the ideals of uniting a diverged country. As the Venezuelan soccer team skyrockets through the ranking, this unites more and more a country of political and social differences showing the country how 'stupid and nonsense' these differences can be. Venezuela is only one. La Vinotinto, our driving force for a more united country.

Dear Bobbie:

How do you tell someone they have very bad hygiene—politely?

That's a very tough question because it's a very sensitive matter. But if it's done in a careful way, they probably will appreciate being told.

First of all, you should find a time to approach them in private. This doesn't mean pulling them aside, because they will just return to their group upset. You should tell them at a time when you both are alone and, if possible, as soon as you notice the hygiene problem (for example, if that day a person did P.E. and their sweat odor stayed on them) so that they don't become paranoid that others noticed it all day but that person himself wasn't aware of it.

Start off with a sincere explanation and an introduction of what you are going to say. For example, "Look, I wanted to talk to you about something that I know is sensitive but it's something that I would like to be brought to my attention. And I really don't want you to be hurt by what I'm going to say, or think I'm doing it to be mean, but I, truly as a friend, want to tell you so that you aren't put in an uncomfortable position in the future." This way, they will see that you have good intentions and are really concerned for them

and don't want others saying hurtful things to them. After that, very gently touch on the subject, explaining to them their hygiene issue and offer helpful tips on what ways they could work on it. Then, to conclude, stress again how you really are looking out for them and that this wasn't a confrontation, but rather a sincere way to help them out and that you hope they aren't offended and hope that they will do the same for you if the situation is ever reversed.


